2023 NIC Lay Members to Annual Conference Reports

I believe the annual conference to be a very eye-opening experience into the deeper depths and workings of the church. The first session I attended at the Annual Conference was the laity session. This was a great introduction to the communications needed throughout the Annual Conference. The next very impactful session was when we voted to allow churches to disaffiliate from the church. Listening to the extensive process required for the churches to go through just to be removed from the United Methodist Church was interesting. Knowing that even through that process, they still decided to go along with the disaffiliation because their belief of not wanting to be a part of the connected system was heartbreaking. Next was the legislative session, I found this interesting because one of the documents (650.01) we discussed in my section did not pass. This discussion led to the legislation being the main talking point on the third day, so I felt more prepared to make my votes throughout the session. The overall annual conference was a great experience to see all that genuinely goes on to ensure the success of all our churches and all the inner working components and committees needed to make us one united church.

I was part of Plenary Group 4 that voted on:

700.07: Encouraging Leadership with Integrity

700.08: Support of a Parole Pathway for Illinois

700.09: In Support of the Pretrial Fairness Act

All three passed: (voting counts are from my session notes)

700.07 was 69 for; 3 against 700.08 was 71 for; 1 against 700.09 was 72 for; 2 against

On 700.08, I was astonished to learn there is no longer any parole in Illinois. How did this come to be???? My great hope is that the UMC will pursue this matter diligently, and I would like to know if I can write to any local representatives to support this effort.

Likewise, with 700.09, I was quite surprised to learn of the blatant disrespect in the issue of pretrial fairness. Wealthy people can afford to bail out; poor people often cannot. To say the least, this can be devastating. I hope the UMC also pushes hard for the correction of this issue.

Note on 700.08 and 700.09: A pastor was there who was very familiar with these issues (I am sorry I did not record his name) and he confirmed the veracity of the issues. He also stated that a judge always has the discretionary power to override pretrial releasing for defendants charged with violent crimes.

An unfortunate ending for 700.07:

Someone collected 25 signatures that caused 700.07 to be subdued unless passed in a vote with the entire NIC body. The legislation was not presented for a vote by the full body. At the very end of the NIC, at about 3:45 PM (the room had to be cleared by 5:00 PM), a vote was held to determine if 700.07 would be presented to the NIC body. Many participants voted yes, many voted no. There was no count stated, other than "the no votes have it." It is my opinion that this was extremely unfair. There was plenty of time remaining to conduct a vote, and one person – who may have had a nefarious agenda? – successfully blocked the legislation. Thereby negating the hard work performed by the individuals who wrote and submitted this document. The NIC was well-organized and well-run, overall. This one issue, with 700.07, is the only thing I felt was mis-

handled.

Document 700.11, Supporting the Removal of Discriminatory Policies, was also passed in the plenary group. A petition was submitted for 700.11 to go to a vote with the entire NIC body and – I am extremely happy to report – this legislation DID get presented and passed with a solid majority vote.

My issue with 700.07 is that if it could be successfully blocked, 700.11 could very well have suffered the same fate. What if 700.11 had not been presented to the entire NIC body? Document 700.11 is so important that the NIC would have been a failure without a vote, regardless of how the vote turned out. Document 700.07 equally deserved to be heard, even if 700.07 has a lower impact that 700.11

On another note, at the very end of the conference, someone talked at a microphone and verbally attacked the bishop. Evidently, the two had some sort of a disagreement. The bishop handled this very well. He preserved order and did not let that person cause a disruption. The person who spoke up? My feeling is that he presented his remarks in a very immature and negative fashion.

I am extremely glad that I was able to attend as a delegate, I am both flattered and honored to have been given this responsibility, and I hope I get to go again in 2024.

I went to the Annual conference this year with a clearer understanding of what to expect because I was able to attend in person last year as well. The first session I was able to attend was the Laity Session. I sat next to a woman from Chicago and paired up with her to discuss the break out questions about how to keep a conversation going when we don't agree with one another. It was wonderful talking with Irma and hearing her perspective on things especially with everything going on in the Methodist Church right now. We agreed that listening to one another and hearing different perspectives is the best way to make decisions for the church.

Going to the Opening and Plenary 1 where we voted on the disaffiliation of churches, I was sad to see so many leaving because of differing views. Seeing the process and cost to disaffiliate was incredible, and in the end, it just made me sad to see so many want to leave the conference. As the morning progressed, I found myself in my designated Legislative Section, discussing two different documents. One of the pieces of legislation was about a resolution in response to the overturning of Roe vs. Wade. There was some interesting discussion both for and against, but in the end the legislation passed. The second piece of legislation was about identifying and opposing Apartheid in the Hold Land. A woman who was one of the authors spoke in detail about the document. The group discussed ideas for and against and ultimately voted to pass the legislation. It was an intriguing experience, and it made me appreciate all the work that goes into preparing the legislation for the conference.

Listening to the Bishop's appeal, attending the Korean Peace Reflections service, and watching the Celebration of Ministry, were all highlights of the conference. On the last day, as things got heated about Pastor's salaries, I was overwhelmed with the passion of many attending the conference and felt the decision shouldn't be taken lightly. I came away from Annual Conference with many positive takeaways and appreciated the opportunity to represent SUMC

Attending the "Connected in Christ – Come to the Table" Northern Illinois Conference was an enlightening experience. I was able to learn how the greater United Melodist Church works as a whole, partake in exciting worship services with 800+ people, create connections, and ultimately – leave with a greater understanding of what my role at SUMC should be.

The theme of the conference centered around inclusion and hospitality, with the most impactful sermon being delivered by Dr. Rolf Nolesco. Rolf shared his experiences from living and working abroad, and spoke of the interconnectedness of the United Methodist Church. His message centered around acceptance of all God's people from a queer viewpoint, which offered attendees a new perspective on how to embrace and support ALL God's people. His words were spoken with compassion, sincerity, and energy that was contagious – never have I heard or seen so many Methodists responding out loud with emphatic "Amens!" After discovering that he is a published author, I ordered one of his books immediately upon returning home.

The voting plenaries of the conference were spread over two days, allowing time for conscientious thought and reflection. While I am not passionate about politics at any level - one of the legislative pieces I voted on transcended politics, and was focused on equality and inclusion. To me, these two practices are at the core of Christian values. I voted to remove discriminatory language from the Book of Discipline – language that directly targeted the LGBTQ+ community in a harmful way. By enacting legislation to remove this language, it shows that the United Methodist Church is progressing towards a more loving, accepting, and inclusive existence within the world.

The fundamental teachings of Wesley: "Do no harm. Do good. Stay in love with God." – were abundantly present at the conference. I pray that this message continues to resonate within our hearts, and is carried out into the world by all of us. Being disciples of Christ implies that we must fervently believe and enact the ideal, that **everyone** is deserving of God's love.
