

She was the founding board member of Justice for our Neighbors (JFON) in the Northern Illinois Conference and currently chairs the Annual Conference committee on Nominations and has served on the Board of Director of the General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR) of the United Methodist Church since 2016.

2025 NIC LAY MEMBERS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORTS

The Annual Conference is an interesting mix of business and worship. On the first day, I attended one of seven legislative sections that addressed multiple pieces of legislation. The two pieces of legislation addressed in my session both passed with the required majority vote of over 80%. The first was titled "Who Are Our Neighbors? Standing with our Immigrants, Refugees, and Asylum Seekers Communities." This piece of legislation reaffirmed the Northern Illinois Conference's (NIC) 'commitment to support the rights of immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers to legal services, health, housing, education, and other necessary services to become full members of our communities.' The second piece of legislation, titled 'Supporting Human Rights Advocacy and the Right to Engage in Nonviolent Actions including Boycotts and Free Speech,' calls upon clergy, lay leaders, and members to support the right to engage in nonviolent resistance including the use of boycotts and divestments. It calls upon these persons to contact their Illinois state Representatives and Senators to urge them to support the Illinois Human Rights Advocacy Protection Act. This act would repeal the 2015 anti-boycott law, 'restore protections for peaceful advocacy, remove legal uncertainty for Illinois organizations, realign state law with fundamental democratic principles, and protect civil society's ability to engage on humanitarian issues.' Throughout the three days we also heard from multiple NIC committees and staff members and we discussed/voted on legislation that did not pass during the individual legislative sessions.

The most meaningful portion of the conference, for me, was the daily Bible Study/Devotion. The theme of the conference was 'Grace is Sufficient.' I learned that grace is not plan B – it IS the plan. We are not disqualified from grace when we're grieving or doubting, because weakness is holy ground. 2 Corinthians 9:8a says 'God has the power to provide you with more than enough of every kind of grace.' We were encouraged to practice three types of grace: 1) Inner grace where we are gentle with ourselves, 2) Relational grace where we offer patience and forgiveness even if someone doesn't earn it, and 3) Creative grace where we entrust God's grace to empower our vision. As I work daily to learn to accept God's grace in my life, my wish for our congregation is that we more fully lean into God's grace every day.

On the first morning a Laity session was given that outlined events, expectations, and the roles that Laity were to uphold during the conference. The afternoon Plenary covered Historic Reports, Daily Procedures, and the Organizing Motions of the conference. We then separated into legislative sections to discuss legislation items in detail. Some of these items included voting on the formation of an LGBTQIA+ conference level committee (Document 700.07), and voting on minimum salaries for full-time elders (Document 680.02). There were also many other legislation items voted on that required amendments, approvals, or denials. Later in the evening, the Celebration of Ministry service announced new ordinations, a sermon entitled "Give Me Your Hand" was given, and a variety of joyful music was performed.

The morning of the second day began with bible study. Immediately following the bible study, an Episcopal address was given and was supplemented by presentations from committees such as the Shepherding team, The Northern Illinois Boad of Trustees, The Insurance Board, etc. Before lunch, we voted on the Consent Calendar. After returning from lunch a memorial service that honored the recently deceased was given, and showed pictures (accompanied by music) of those who had served the church

The third morning began with the continuation of the prior day's bible study, immediately followed by a Laity Address, the Cabinet Report, and legislation nominations. Afterwards, a retirement service ensued, which acknowledged and celebrated those retiring by means of showcasing heartfelt testimonials (and more music). After we returned from lunch, a significant amount of discussion surrounding church apportionments took place. There was notable disagreement on how to address apportionments, but after much debate, the voting body came to a consensus.

In conclusion: the three days of the conference were loaded with a variety of informative presentations, opportunities to worship, and covered multiple aspects of legislation. Attending the conference is always a joyful and uplifting experience — and offers significant insight into the inner workers of the Church. This is an event that I would recommend that all SUMC members attend at least once.

This was my second year to attend the Northern Illinois Annual Conference held June 9-11 in Schaumburg. The underlying theme of the conference was Grace is Sufficient. Of big importance was the prior education before attending and then actual voting of four constitutional amendments: 1) Regionalization; 2) Inclusion in Membership; 3) Racial Justice; 4) Educational Requirements for Clergy Voting Rights. Regionalization had been talked about at SUMC the last two years. Essentially conferences outside the US can adapt the Methodist Book of Discipline to their own contexts, and the amendment would place all worldwide conferences on an equal footing. The inclusion and racial justice amendments adds language for accepting all persons, races and abilities to be baptized and serve as professing members in any local church, and denounces white privilege and white supremacy.

I enjoyed participating in my laity legislation group, the Celebration of Ministry with the ordination of 6 new Elders for the conference, the two bible studies,, the Bishop's episcopal address, and the live music performed by the conference praise team. Here are a few of my personal take-aways from the conference.

<u>Laity legistation</u>; My laity breakout group considered legislation for minimum salaries for full time elders and licensed local pastors (LLP). The legislation proposed cash salary increases of full time pastors from a base in 2023 at \$32,450 for elders with increases of 7% recommended yearly to 2026 at \$46,669. Lesser increases for LLP were recommended with a 2026 minimum cash salary recommendation of \$42,668. Our group had lay members offering pro and con arguments before passing the legislation as recommended by over 2/3 voting affirmatively.

Bible Study provided by Reverend Dr. Reggie Blount of Garrett Evangelical Seminary

Dr. Blount led the Tuesday Bible study with a Job biblical grace theme with these points:

- Grace tells the truth
- Grace trusts power through the broken
- · Weakness is holy ground
- Grace is not a detour; it is devine design
- Through grace when I reach my limit I am made stronger

For Dr. Blount's leading the study on Wednesday he spoke of how grace abounds, based on 2 Corinthians 9:6-10.

- God's grace is not rationed out; generosity is the natural fruit of grace
- Grace's abundance is meant to flow outward
- Grace is a way of life we practice
- Grace is a spiritual discipline; be gentle with yourself; offer patience and forgiveness to others, and trust grace to empower your vision
- Lead, give, dream as grace is sufficient

Bishop Dan Schwerin message

The Bishop again as last year addressed how the United Methodist Church should work to remain relevant: we are the body of Christ for this storm!

- Ongoing recent local Methodist experimental models to address declining membership are: Southside Collaboration; Garett Resilience Hub; Rosecrance center for substance abuse treatment; Hispanic outreach
- Change from old style UMC and discard old baggage; Love the people- love the church less; What are we called to do during a storm? MacGyver it if need be.
- Become allies of those on the margins (sanctuary moment); our resistance is non-violent love; my wellbeing is your well-being

In short, we are the body of Christ, so don't be tired or weary doing God's work.

Laity address by Reverend Eugene Williams

His message was that grace is unconditional love for all, including the stranger and the immigrant. He pointed this out through the immigrant theology of Leviticus 19:34 and Matthew 25:35.

- The storms of life are always raging but we laity provide hope and encouragement; remove barriers for equity
- Lead courageously; celebrate connections—we all belong to God
- We will experience discomfort with current change; we don't get distracted by alternate facts
- DEI is "definitely earned it"
- Don't get down but go to prayer; God is in control
- Our Great Commission will endure long after any executive orders

The NIC was very well organized, it was well run, and disagreements were kept civil. Several speakers were included in the program, and their speeches were very inspirational. The Bishop gave two sermons, both of which were excellent. Bishop Schwerin was really funny, and he delivered an extremely powerful message.

Bishop Schwerin:

Overall, the NIC recognizes that we are losing congregations, we are not getting funding to the extent we did previously, and we need to espond by <u>emphasizing meaning</u>. We do this by *working together* and *combining resources*.

He talked about MacGyver, and I did not know what that meant.

Rev. Blount:

Paul did not say we were given "just enough" grace.

We have been granted a **surplus** of grace.

Think of grace as a state of being.

One of the last speakers (I am sorry, but my notes do not have his name):

It does not matter who is in the State House, the White House, or the outhouse; God is in charge.

Four amendments were voted upon, and each one passed:

Ballot #1: Regionalization

- No change to Methodist beliefs
- Makes all regions equal
- Does give all nations an equal voice

Ballot #2: Inclusion in Membership

• Adds *Gender and Ability* to the list of identities that <u>cannot be used</u> to discriminate against membership DS Brian Gilbert gave an example of why we need this:

He talked about an experience he had with one of the evangelical churches. A boy in a wheelchair, age 6, was refused baptism because he could not walk to the baptismal font, and if you are not baptized by immersion — in **THAT church** — then you are going to hell. Furthermore, if you are in a wheelchair, that is because of something you did so you will be going to hell anyway. Can you imagine **anyone** saying such things??? I think I would have responded with, "Well, if I do end up in hell, I will plan on seeing YOU there. So there will be somebody I already know." Anyway, the Methodist church did baptize the boy.

Ballot #3: Racial Justice

Intended to eliminate any innate language in the UMC that authorizes or promotes white privilege.

Learned some things about discrimination:

- There can be conscious bias
- There can be unconscious bias
- There can be implicit bias

All of these are extremely hurtful to anyone who is subjected to these

Ballot #4: Educational Requirements for Voting Rights

No change to the rules

Does clarify and adds consideration to the voting process for clergy, delegates, etc.
